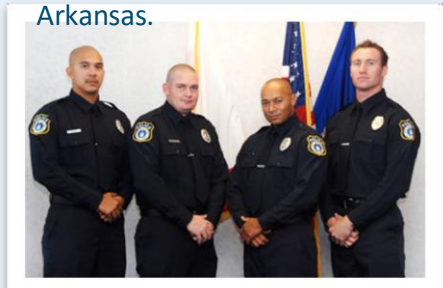

Our law enforcement teams function like a local police force on Air Force bases and other installations, protecting against criminal activity and providing a measure of security for Airmen, their families, and the thousands of civilians on each base. Our police officers also complete clearance and background checks vital to maintaining security and attend the Veterans Affairs Law Enforcement Training Center in Little Rock, Arkansas.





Police Training

Candidates attend a DoD POST certificate course at the Veterans Affairs Law Enforcement Training Center and the U.S. Marine Corps Basic Police Officer Course. Our GS-0083 Police Series civilians are integral to the Air Force's operational readiness and enable Security Forces to meet mission requirements. Collectively, Security Forces and Civilian Police must train and equip the force to conduct law enforcement activities in support of military department and defense agency requirements.

Police Duties

Civilian police have full powers of apprehension and detention, which entails carrying a firearm, mirandizing suspects, preserving evidence, and testifying in court as it pertains to enforcing regulations within assigned jurisdiction. The unit also supports National Security Special Events in the National Capital Region.



Officers also serve as the primary command and control function for all Integrated Defense forces. In addition, police officers act as the initial on scene commander for significant and catastrophic events (e.g. active shooter, terrorist attacks, and natural disasters).
