COLONEL ANDREW “ANDY” C. DERMANOSKI

Col. Andrew C. “Andy” Dermanoski is the Commander, Space Base Delta 3 (SBD 3), Los Angeles Air Force Base, El Segundo, California. He leads five squadrons and six staff agencies, supporting over 7,000 personnel with \$1 billion in physical plant assets and manages the annual execution of a \$61.4 million annual budget. SBD 3 provides medical services, civil engineering and logistics, communications, chaplain services, security, personnel and readiness programs, and quality-of-life services to the installation, including the co-located Field Command, Space Systems Command, the base housing areas at Fort MacArthur, San Pedro, California, and many other Department of Defense units in the Los Angeles area.

Col. Dermanoski commissioned in the US Army as a Military Intelligence officer in June 2001, after graduating from the United States Military Academy in West Point, New York. He’s served in a variety of leadership positions at the company, battalion, brigade and corps levels, including assignments within the Intelligence and Security Command (INSCOM), V Corps, US Army Europe (USAREUR), and XVIII Airborne Corps. He held company command in US Army Garrison BENELUX and Installation Management Command (IMCOM) – Europe. Additionally, he was nominated and board-selected to serve as the primary Admissions Officer for the Western Region for the United States Military Academy. He completed his final Army assignment as the Brigade S3 for the 66th Military Intelligence Brigade in Wiesbaden Germany. On June 7, 2022, Col. Dermanoski transferred into the U.S. Space Force. Prior to his current position, Col. Dermanoski was the Deputy Director, Space Sensing Program Executive Office for Space Systems Command, Los Angeles Air Force Base, El Segundo, California.

Throughout his career, he’s served four combat tours in Iraq—Operations IRAQI FREEDOM and INHERENT RESOLVE as part of 13 total years stationed overseas. Additionally, he is a graduate of the Sabalauski Air Assault School and the Army Airborne School at Ft. Benning, Georgia.

HISTORY

IN NOVEMBER 1940 THE 61ST TRANSPORT GROUP WAS ESTABLISHED AND TRAINED TO DROP PARATROOPERS AND PULL GLIDERS DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR. THEY DEPLOYED FIRST TO NORTH AFRICA. THEY TOOK PART IN THE ALLIED INVASION OF SICILY AND OF THE ITALIAN MAINLAND IN 1943. IN 1944, THEY RELOCATED TO ENGLAND, JUST IN TIME TO PLAY A PROMINENT ROLE IN LANDING TROOPS DURING THE ALLIED INVASIONS OF NORMANDY ON D-DAY AND OF HOLLAND IN OPERATION MARKET GARDEN. IN 1945, THEY FLEW TROOPS AND SUPPLIES IN THE ALLIED PUSH ACROSS THE RHINE.

THE 61ST REMAINED IN GERMANY AFTER THE WAR. THEY FLEW THE BERLIN AIRLIFT FROM START TO FINISH DURING 1948-1949, AND THEY WERE ONE OF THE MAJOR MOVERS OF SUPPLIES DURING THE ENTIRE YEAR-LONG, SUCCESSFUL OPERATION TO KEEP WEST BERLIN ALIVE DURING THE SOVIET BLOCKADE.

THE 61ST RELOCATED TO THE PACIFIC JUST IN TIME FOR THE BEGINNING OF THE KOREAN WAR. THEY FLEW TROOPS AND SUPPLIES INTO KOREA DURING 1950-1952 AND ALSO CARRIED OUT SOME VERY RISKY EVACUATIONS OF US TROOPS. EARLY IN THE WAR, THEY PERFORMED ONE OF THEIR MOST FAMOUS EXPLOITS WHEN THEY TRANSPORTED ALMOST 1,000 STARVING KOREAN WAR ORPHANS OUT OF THE PATH OF THE ADVANCING COMMUNIST FORCES. THEY FLEW THEM TO TEMPORARY FACILITIES ON JEJU ISLAND; AND BEGAN A COLLECTION TO FEED AND CLOTHE THEM.

THE 61ST WAS INACTIVATED IN 1959. IT WAS REACTIVATED IN 1984 AND EARNED ANOTHER STREAMER IN OPERATION JUST CAUSE IN PANAMA. THE 61ST FLEW OTHER STRATEGIC OPERATIONS IN CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA. THE 61ST WAS INACTIVATED AGAIN IN 1992 AFTER THE PERSIAN GULF WAR.

THE 61ST AIR BASE GROUP WAS ACTIVATED IN 1994 AT LOS ANGELES AIR FORCE BASE, WHERE THEY REPLACED THE 655TH AIR BASE SQUADRON. THE 61ST ABG PROVIDED THE ADMINISTRATIVE AND BASE SERVICES FOR THE PERSONNEL ASSIGNED TO THE BASE UNDER THE SPACE AND MISSILE SYSTEMS CENTER. THE ABG CONTINUED TO DISTINGUISH THEMSELVES IN THEIR NEW ROLE. THE 61ST ABG WAS REDESIGNATED AS THE 61ST MISSION SUPPORT GROUP ON 1 AUGUST 2006. IT WAS THEN REDESIGNATED BACK TO THE 61ST ABG ON 30 JULY 2010. THE 61ST ABG WON THREE AIR FORCE OUTSTANDING UNIT AWARDS WHILE SUPPORTING LOS ANGELES AIR FORCE BASE.

LOS ANGELES GARRISON WAS ACTIVATED IN 2021 THEN REDESIGNATED SPACE BASE DELTA 3 IN 2022.

Col. Mia L. Walsh is the Commander, Space Base Delta 3 (SBD 3), Los Angeles Air Force Base, El Segundo, Calif. She leads five squadrons and six staff agencies, totaling more than 850 personnel with \$1.3 billion in physical plant assets and manages the annual execution of a \$60 million budget. SBD 3 serves as the support function for the base providing medical services, civil engineering, communications, chaplain services, installation security, logistical support, personnel assistance and readiness, and quality-of-life services to the Space Systems Command and many other Department of Defense units in the Los Angeles basin.

Col. Walsh entered the Air Force in 1998 after receiving her commission through the Reserve Officer Training Program at the University of Hawaii. She is experienced in intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) launch operations as well as space surveillance and completed staff tours at both the MAJCOM and Air Staff. She was the Chief of Operations in the National Joint Operations and Intelligence Center (NJOIC), Current Operations Element, J-33, Joint Staff, Washington, D.C. She served as the Commander, 18th Space Control Squadron (now the 18th Space Defense Squadron), Vandenberg SFB, California. The 18th Space Defense Squadron executes command and control of the space domain awareness mission.

Prior to her current position, Col. Walsh served as the Chief of Operations, National Joint Operations and Intelligence Center, Deputy Directorate for Current and Integrated Operations, Joint Staff J33, Pentagon, Washington, D.C. The NJOIC is the Joint Staff's 24/7 watch floor that monitors and reports on global Joint Force operations and supports Department of Defense leadership with situational awareness and global crisis monitoring.

LIEUTENANT GENERAL PHILIP A. GARRANT

Lieutenant General Philip A. Garrant is Commander, Space Systems Command, headquartered at Los Angeles Air Force Base, California. He is responsible for more than 15,000 military, civilian and contractor personnel worldwide and an annual budget of \$15.6 billion, while managing the research, design, development, acquisition, launch and sustainment of satellites and the associated command and control systems. His extensive portfolio includes military satellite communication, missile warning, navigation and timing, space-based weather, space launch and test ranges, space superiority, responsive space and other emerging evolutionary space programs.

Prior to Space Systems Command, Lt. Gen. Garrant served as the Deputy Chief of Space Operations, Strategy, Plans, Programs, and Requirements, and had the overall responsibility for the strategies, requirements, and budget of the United States Space Force.

Lt. Gen. Garrant received his commission from the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps program at the University of Maryland in 1991. During his career, he has served in a variety of acquisition positions including Systems Engineer, Program Manager, Program Element Monitor, Squadron Commander, Senior Materiel Leader, Deputy Program Executive Officer and Program Executive.
